

1. Protracted Relief and Recovery Operation (PRRO 200540):

Duration: July 2013 to December 2015

Beneficiaries targeted: 3.6 million

Beneficiary reached monthly: 900,000

(January-June 2014)

Total cost: US\$ 415 million

Requirements for 2014: US\$ 165 million

Operation objectives:

Provide life-saving food assistance for Internally displaced people and refugees in conflict affected areas.

Support early recovery of people returning to their areas of origin. Ensure children school attendance through emergency school feeding.

Reduce malnutrition trough Nutritional support to children aged 6-59 months, pregnant and lactating women.

Support access to markets and education. Resilience, reinforce national capacities.

Priorities For 2014:

With a view to increase inputs in the context of limited resources, WFP reprioritized is interventions as follow:

- Refocused school feeding in emergency and transitional context.
- Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) treatment in priority areas.
- Prevention of acute malnutrition in areas where Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) exceeds 15 percent.







Supporting Innovation

Trough **Cash and Vou**chers transfers, to reinforce social cohesion between internally displaced people, and host populations. Approximately US\$ 400,000 monthly cash or voucher based transfer to beneficiaries.

Supported by the Humanitarian Innovation Fund, the **Mobile Vulnerability Analysis**system uses mobile voice recognition technology for the collection of household food security data. Data will allow real time decision making.

As of June 2014, 60 percent of the targeted beneciaries responded to the Mobile Vulnerability analysis.

2. Special Operation to Strength the Food **Security Cluster Coordination** (SO 200661)



Duration: March 2014 to March 2015

Lead by FAO and WFP, and co-facilitated with Action Against Hunger. The Food Security Cluster coordinates food security responses to displaced people and optimizes collaboration with UN agencies, NGOs, donors and other stakeholders.

Cost: US\$ 1,522,378

Shortfall: US\$ 1,411,849 over the next six months

3. Special Operation Logistics Cluster Coordination and Emergency Road Infrastructure Repairs (SO 200747)

Duration: September 2014 to August 2016

On the basis of the previous Logistics Cluster Special Operation (SO200456) that ended in August 2014, the new SO will continue to provide support to the humanitarian community through logistics service provision to WFP and the Humanitarian Community. The operation also provides **road transport** as well as storage facilities to government and humanitarian partners.

Cost: US\$ 9,408,023

5. Strenghtening smallholder farmers value chains in DRC



The Purchase for Progress is part of the global initiative which includes 21 countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America. The programme in DRC focuses on reviving agricultural commodity markets through capacity development to smallholders farmers as well as construction and rehabilitation of Infrastructures.

4. Special Operation Provision of Humanitarian Air Service in DRC, UNHAS. (SO 200504)

Duration: January 2013 to December 2014

Provide safe, reliable, efficient and cost-effective air transport services to humanitarian organizations and donor representatives in DRC.

5 chartered aircraft; 3, 200 Passengers transported monthly; 20 tons of light humanitarian cargo (vaccines, medical supplies and ICT equipment) transported monthly.

Cost: US\$ 25 million
